Flowers Blooming in August

This month's location is Clark Fork which is another site off of SR 108 and has an elevation of about 6500 feet. The trail has a rather gentle grade of plus 200-300 feet for the first 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles and has more than 100 species blooming at various

Our first flower is the Creek Dogwood (Cornus sericea) a member of the dogwood family (Cornacea) and has a white flower that is quite different from its cousin the Mountain Dogwood. It likes an area where its roots can be kept wet. The next flower is the California Waterleaf (Hydrophyllum californicum) a member of the waterleaf family (Hydrophyllaceae) and has a white flowering head and can be found by the hundreds along this trail. The Swamp Onion (Allium validum) which is a member of the lily family (Liliaceae) can be found in the meadow and along the trail with its large purplish flowering head. This plant definitely likes moist to wet areas to grow in.

Hopefully, this will be another location that you will explore at your own pace and personally find enjoyment in discovering what's blooming here when you visit!

FIELD TRIPS

For all field trips: bring lunch, water, sunscreen and appropriate clothing and footwear. Hiking level varies with each trip. Your trip will be enhanced by bringing field guides and magnifying lenses, although these are optional. Carpooling is encouraged. Call ahead if the weather looks iffy. Check our website and Facebook pages or http://www.twitter.com/SIE_CNPS for updates. Our field trips are open to everyone. Bring a friend or two. It is Chapter policy that pets are not allowed on our field trips. We would appreciate everyone's adherence to this policy.

The June 25th Long John Meadow field trip was an excellent day spent wandering in two mountain meadows. Eleven members and guests explored the many interesting plants with trip leader Scott Brush. Among the many plants in bloom were the lesser star tulip (*Calochortus minimus*), mountain prettyface (*Triteleia ixioides* ssp. *anilina*), and four species of monkeyflowers, including the diminutive Brewer's monkeyflower (*Mimulus breweri*). Many thanks to Scott for leading such a great day.

On July 9th, twelve folks followed Joanna Clines two miles up Shuteye Peak to view the Shuteye Peak Fawn Lily (Erythronium pluriflorum). Some participants traveled from as far as Los Angeles and the Bay area for this rare opportunity. The fawn lily was in full glorious bloom as were other noteworthy species Kellogg's lewisia (Lewisia kelloggii), the Sierra Onion (Allium obtusum) and steer's heads (Dicentra uniflora). The views from Shuteye were breathtaking and the melting snows and thin granitic soils provided lots of belly flowers to explore. It was a long day and the roads were rough but everyone agreed that it was a fabulous field trip. Thank you, Joanna, for leading this rare trip.

July 23-24 - Sweetwater Mountains. Leader: Pat Stone. Hiking level: moderate (high elevation). The Sweetwater Mountains offer an interesting mix of Sierra Nevada and high desert, basin and ranges habitats and plants. This botanical excursion will include an overnight, primitive camping experience with a potluck dinner Saturday night. Bring enough water for drinking, cooking, etc. Don't want to camp? Come for a long day and head home when you want to. Meet at 8:30a.m. at the back of the parking lot between the Sonora McDonalds and the new Kohl's, on Mono Way, in

the Junction Shopping Center, in East Sonora. For more information, contact Pat at 209-984-0304, patmstone@gmail.com.

July 30 - Saint Mary's Pass. Leader: Bob Brown. Hiking level: strenuous (high elevation, steep trail to top of pass). This is a steady climb with a one way distance of 1-1/2 to 2 miles (for a round trip distance of up to 4 miles). We should see a nice variety of alpine and sub-alpine plants ranging from orchids to elephant heads. Meet at 8:30a.m. in Twain Harte, at the eastern side of the parking lot in the Twain Harte Market Shopping Center. For more information, contact Bob at 209-928-9281 or rbrown4674@aol.com.

August 13 (& 14 optional) - Dana Plateau, Leaders: Alison Colwell and Scott Brush. Hiking level: strenuous (high elevation & steep trail). This will be a high Sierra botanical excursion off of Highway 120 just east of Yosemite National Park to see one of the more accessible alpine cushion plant communities in the Sierra Nevada. There's an overnight option to backpack in and enjoy a night under the light of the full moon. Yosemite National Park has a \$20 per vehicle entrance fee. Meet at 9:00a.m. at the Forest Service pullout overlooking the west end of Tioga Lake, about three quarters of a mile east of Tioga Pass Entrance Station. From the Sonora area, meet Bob Brown at 6:00a.m. in front of the Tesoro Gas Station on Highway 108 in Jamestown. For more information, contact Alison at 240-997-5153 or Scott at 209-962-7825 ext. 553 (leave message) or 209-962-5291 (evenings). RSVP to Scott for the overnight backpack (Scott will order up the group wilderness permit). Note that the overnight will be above 11,000 feet and could be very windy. Overnight temps as low as 20 degrees F are uncommon but possible. No campfires are allowed at that elevation.

August 27 - Reynolds Creek Moonworts. Leader: Jennie Haas. Hiking level: easy. Moonworts are fern allies in the genus *Botrychium*. These fascinating, diminutive plants are quite elusive. We'll see a common species, two rare species and a new-to-California species discovered in 2010 - all in the same meadow. From Sonora, meet at 8:30a.m. at the back of the parking lot between the Sonora McDonalds and the new Kohl's, on Mono Way, in the Junction Shopping Center, in East Sonora. From Groveland, meet at 8:30a.m. at the Groveland Library parking lot. Both groups will meet at about 9:30 at the intersection of Cottonwood Road and Forest Road 3N01S, just east of Reed Creek.
